New Apartments Dedicated & Occupied

🔻wo beautiful apartment buildings off Kiplinger and Delaware Avenues were only dirt and fittings in July. By February, students were carrying boxes and bags into their new homes at the west facility. On March 17, a dedication ceremony marked the beginning of suite living for the York Col-

"Today represents the culmination of years of planning and hard work," said Dean of Students Barbara Goodwin. "We'll be able to keep upperclassmen on campus, to help them fully engage in the college experience. We're blessed to have this facility and staff who know education is about many things. Students come here with anticipation because this is where they grow to know who they will be."

President Baker agreed that having the students living on campus will be a benefit. "We're calling our students back to campus," he said. "We will have a 100 percent campus living policy next year — we believe we'll be better if we have everyone here." Baker commended Dean Goodwin and Vice-President Todd Sheldon "for working tirelessly to make this happen."

Each apartment unit within the buildings houses four students, who have individual bedrooms and share a living room and kitchen. There are also large commons areas on the main floor of each building.

Rusty Ridley, student body president, said the students were excited about the new housing facilities — right in the heart of the campus. "We're a stone's throw away" from classes, intramural sports, and the college facilities, Ridley said. "Proximity has a big influence on presence. It's important for students to be close to where things are happening — it will make a difference with the vitality of our campus."

After the York College Concert Choir performed a couple of songs and the ribbon was cut, the crowd was allowed to tour the inside of the women's residence. Since students had already moved in, visitors were able to see what the arrangements were like and how homey they are.

"We are mindful of the blessings given to York College," Sheldon said. "And we pray we use these to God's glory."

Dean Kenneth Starr Addresses Graduates

amily and friends filled the seats of the York City Auditorium as the

> York College class of 2006, some 98 in all, walked across the stage to receive their diplomas from college president Wayne Baker.

> With Pomp and Circumstance the faculty led graduates, attired in black gown and mortar board, into the auditorium.

Baker began his welcome with a brief statement, "Congratulations, go out and get a job, remember the alumni fund, remember York College in your will and thank you for going to school here." Chuckles could be heard from the audience as Baker informed graduates if they thought those were the sum total of his remarks, he was sorry, it wasn't so.

"You know you didn't get here by yourself," Baker admonished, reminding graduates of the prayers and sacrifices of parents as they waited for this moment.

"You did not get here by yourself, but they couldn't do it for you," Baker told the class of 2006. "With many papers and tests in your past, you did it, and you did it well. Congratulations."

Dean and Professor of Law at Pepperdine University School of Law, Dr. Kenneth Starr, presented the commencement address. Starr is a native of Texas who has served the United States of America in varied capacities during his career in jurisprudence.

"It is a privilege to be here today. I join in congratulating you," said Starr as he recalled comments made by host of NBC's Meet the Press, Tim Russert who once told a group of graduates he too had sat through many a commencement address in his life, and couldn't remember a single word from any of them. At which

time Starr promised to keep his portion

of the program to a lean 15 minutes.

While holding his nephew, Dan Asperheim shares a moment with fellow English graduates, Lloyd and Laura (Hammond) Armbrust. Despite giving birth to Emmaline Rogue during the year, Laura stayed very active in numerous campus groups and still managed to graduate Summa Cum Laude with a perfect 4.0 gpa. She was presented the

By attending college, "you have been able to deepen your ability to learn for a lifetime and also deepen your faith in peace and tranquility.

"I predict you will look back not so much on this day but on these years," Starr told the graduating class.

speaker is called upon to offer friendly advice, with the expectation graduates would reflect on it. The advice offered up by Starr would be drawn from three stories. First, from the life of a young man of Godly parents who grew up on a farm in Kansas. A young man of good work ethic who went into Kansas City, started a business and prospered. After a time, this young man moved across this land to Pepperdine started a small Christian college in the state.

Pepperdine gave, and you can give too, "that's a chicken. It behaves through lives of purpose.

"It is more blessed to give. Everything you give away you have," quoted Starr, "and everything you hold on to will evaporate."

Starr charged his young audience to consider adopting a nation, offering as an example the story of a lawyer who found himself profoundly moved by the collapse of the Berlin Wall. This attorney felt a call to go help, and has since developed a

relationship with the deeply impoverished nation of Albania, making trips there twice a year to help build and encourage the struggling country.

"That's his vacation, helping spread religious liberty," says Starr as he again asked his audience to "find a place you care for and pray about it." Become a peacemaker and source of reconciliation Traditionally, a commencement in our suffering and hurting world. No travel would be required. "Be a binder of wounds," as Abraham Lincoln said shortly after his inaugural.

> In his closing admonition, Starr asked that graduates, "Be bold regarding the greatness to which you are capable," as he recalled a story told by Bishop Desmond Tutu of an odd looking bird — who behaved like a chicken.

One day the owner of the chicken had California, where in 1937, George a visitor who remarked, "Hey, that's no chicken, that's an eagle."

"No," said the farmer,



Proverbs 29:18.

In the parable of the talents (Matthew 25), the master gives three servants different amounts according to their ability. Two servants traded with their talents and gained more. One servant hid his talent in the ground. The two who saw an increase were commended for a good job as faithful servants and rewarded with more. The one was condemned as wicked and lazy and had his talent taken away.

This parable is often used to prompt consideration of how we use our talents for the Kingdom. I see this parable as one of stewardship with three components regarding how we use our money, talents, and opportunities. "For we have brought nothing into the world, so we cannot take anything out of it either." (I Timothy 6:7). In fact, God owns everything (Psalm 50, Haggai 2:8, Job 12, Col. 1:16-17, among others) and we are merely stewards of those resources. A steward is one who manages another's property, finances, or other affairs. It is the responsible management of something entrusted to one's care.

Stewardship begins the day we are born. While technically, stewardship responsibilities may end upon death, it extends beyond death, because proper estate planning may allow for the greatest use of what God has entrusted to all of us.

Proper stewardship requires time and planning so that resources are not wasted. It is a process to follow God's law while taking advantage of man's laws regarding taxes and other related issues. Proper planning can negate potential waste due to taxes and estate administration costs. Proper financial stewardship applies to savings, retirement planning, and estate planning, as well as other areas, to not waste God's resources.

As you consider your financial and estate planning, I encourage considering it from a stewardship viewpoint. Not only will you be greatly rewarded, but also able to make a great impact on the Kingdom.

Drs. Harold & Harriet (Thomas) Walker

w hen Harold and Harriet (Thomas) Walker wed in 1949, just after graduating from York College, both had already had a number of adventures. He served for three years in the US military as a B29 pilot during WWII. She grew up as a missionary kid in Sierra Leone, West Africa. After leaving York, the thrillseeking twosome moved to the Alaskan Territory—before it became a state in 1959—where they "'pioneered' in a little village that had no running water, electricity, plumbing, or phone service" for two years, according to Harriet.

Harriet recently had a book published based on this period in their lives. Called Your Alaskan Daughter, her book is based on letters that she wrote to her mother (then the manager of the York College bookstore) and others during their Alaskan sojourn. The book discusses many things of interest about life in Alaska; it also talks about York College

history, as Harriet corresponds with Daughter her mother about the possible closing of the college. an author, hav-


Pilot's Overseas Diary: The End and Aftermath of World War II in 2002. His book is based on the personal diary he kept while serving in Tinian and the Philippines in 1945 and 1946. In his book he shares a thrilling story about bailing out of a plane that was going down over the ocean, and becoming a member of the Caterpillar Club—servicemen whose lives were saved by a parachute.

Harold was so grateful for his properly packed chute, he not only tracked down the packer to thank him personally, he also saved the parachute

with the intention of having it made into a wedding gown when he found a bride.

and Harriet went on to earn doctoral degrees, he in Public Administration, and she in Foundations of Education. They have used their talents in many capacities: as teachers, lay ministers, public

ong time L Y o r k College faculty member Dottie Dr. Schulz has resigned her teaching post to continue her work with

Missions Resource Network, a Texasbased non-profit ministry that serves missionaries and church planting groups.

Schulz has been a part of MRN since its inception in 1998, when she became a board member. In 2004, Schulz announced that she would be taking a three-year leave of absence to work fulltime at MRN as the Director for Missionary Care. In January, she decided to make that change permanent, resigning from York College with plans to stay on at MRN.

Schulz is highly qualified for her position at MRN, as she and her late-husband Tom, served as missionaries for 15 years in Amsterdam, The Netherlands. Both graduated from York College, and later went on to earn their doctoral degrees from UNL, specializing in missionary reentry. Both taught at YC for many years and became a vital part of campus life. Dottie served YC as an Assistant Professor of Family Studies from 1978-1985. and a Professor of Psychology and Family Studies from 1991-2006. She was also the Director of the Counseling Center, and the Coordinator of the Crisis Management Program. Both she and Tom were integral to the work of the Master's Apprentice Program (MAP), a missions program designed for college students.

"It is a difficult decision to leave York College because it was Tom's and my physical and spiritual home when we were in Holland and after our return," said Schulz in an email to President Baker. "I am totally convinced that I am in this place because this is where God wants me to be. I just felt God called me here and I needed to be obedient to that call. Everything I have ever learned from every paid and unpaid job I have ever held is useful in this place. It is like God

had been grooming me all along for this unique position."

When asked what she will miss most about York, Dottie's response was an emotional list of things that make up the YC experience. "What will I miss most? Everything! Friday chapels... Sunday evening student worship... speaking to the students in chapel... a good interchange with students in class on most any controversial topic... hearing a student yell out "Dottie" and come running up to join me... special dinners with faculty and staff... impromptu parties... Songfest... the plays... the choir concerts...

the Chamber Singers... the baptisms that take place at midnight... having 30 students in my house to eat every Sunday evening.... MY FRIENDS..... what will I not miss?"

There were also a few comments she wanted to share especially with the students at YC: "I love you. Your generation is one of the most spiritual I've seen in a long time. I love the way you love Jesus and hate religion! Jesus hated religion. I love the way you

feel about community! Jesus loved community! I love the way you want to serve - the sacrifices you will make to do God's will. I love it that you want to be mentored. Seek out Godly mentors and measure them by God's word. Don't lose these things. Don't ever stop loving God and seeking after Him and loving the communities you form around Jesus. Hang in there! Your future is more uncertain, but your love for God will help you survive. Go Panthers!"


Benedictus, IV. Agnus Dei and V. Finale. Roush said the movement back and forth between Latin and English offers a rare treat to the audience.

"This is just a marvelous work. I think it's the first time in Nebraska that it's been performed with a full orchestra."

An anonymous donor generously provided the majority of the funds for the orchestra, keeping the ticket prices affordable at just \$5 per seat.

With anticipation Roush added, "I'm hoping people will understand the magnitude of the event and that the place will be packed."

He got his wish as over 700 filled the theatre and became part of something very wonderful. It was an evening of rare and special beauty, and for many, the performance of a lifetime.



Lester said he was a little concerned about getting up close and personal with the pig as he said, "I have hunted her relatives and barbequed them...I wasn't sure if she held a family





Dylan's dad, David, who graduated from York College in 2000, talked about the incredible support they had received over the past two years, crediting the college students with a big part of their faith walk.

York College History professor, Tim McNeese made his debut on national television this past winter, appearing on the History Channel's presentation: Risk Takers, History Makers: John Wesley Powell and the Grand Canyon. The hour long program premiered primetime at 7:00 p.m. February 28 and ran twice again in March. McNeese was the documentary's consulting historian, providing background and biographical information on John Wesley Powell.

The subject of the program, onearmed explorer John Wesley Powell, was the first person to lead an expedition down the uncharted portion of the Colorado River in 1869. His voyage included passing through the Grand Canyon, a feat never before accomplished.

"Powell really was the last great American explorer," noted McNeese. "After him, there wasn't much left to 'discover' in the American West, which makes his expedition that much more important."

Powell's expedition party, which included nine other men, faced grueling challenges as they negotiated passages through hundreds of river rapids. Their food supplies became wet and spoiled, and the expedition faced near starvation before completing their journey through the Grand Canyon. McNeese participated in physical challenges designed to replicate incidents Powell and his men experienced during their 100-day, 1,000mile journey down the Colorado River.

The series' host, Chris Warner, along with Greg Davenport, and McNeese were required to row a 19th century wooden rowboat over a dozen rapids, free float a set of rapids, be plucked from a rock surrounded by rapids during a mock rescue after a simulated boat wreck, line a boat with ropes through rocky rapids, and scale canyon walls.

This was the first project of this type McNeese had been involved in. "I never thought I'd do something like this...I mean, you watch some of these programs and think, 'hey, I could do that,' but that's not really the same," said McNeese.

YC doesn't have to worry about McNeese 'quitting his day job' to pursue a career as a TV historian, though. "[this opportunity] just showed up out of the blue, and I've enjoyed it, but it's just gravy for me. It's not where I've geared my career," he said. "I don't sit around thinking, gee, I wonder when the next one's going to come along."

The episode of Risk Takers, History Makers was made as a pilot for a History Channel series. Even though it was not made into a series, McNeese was excited to see the finished product on TV. "I'm happy with it. They've done a good job with the editing," said McNeese.

As if it were a movie premier, many of the college family gathered in McGehee Hall to watch the airing of the documentary. Complete with popcorn and other refreshments, the program was projected on a wall where McNeese almost appeared larger than

McNeese has hosted additional viewings of the exploration with civic groups and special college events such as High School Days and Round Up. York College's national celebrity also gave ra-

dio and TV interviews about the filming. However, when asked how all the attention in the limelight compares with becoming a grandfather... two times over... (Ethan Brooks Dickinson - Feb. 1st and Adrianna Elena McNeese -March 4th), he quickly put things in perspective. "It doesn't compare at all. The highlight of my spring was being there when my grandchildren were born."

As author of a biography on Marco Polo, McNeese recently previewed and edited the entry on Polo for the 2007 edition of the World Book Encyclopedia. He has also been approached by National Geographic to be a potential consulting historian for a program on The Great Wall of China. Currently, McNeese is planning his 86th book, a joint venture with YC faculty and authors Dr. Shane Mountjoy and Dr. Larry Van Meter. Their eight book series will cover the early colonial settlements.



In May, McNeese was the featured lecturer during Round Up, York College's annual elder hostel. After watching the documentary on Powell's expedition, McNeese answered questions on the filming.

Williams Signs with the Chicago Cubs

AIA All-American slugger Jeremy Williams is one of those rare exceptions to the rule, extending his playing days beyond those of college ball. 
Jeremy inks his contract with the Chicago Cubs as Tom Schaefer, a scout for the organization, looks on.

In an interview with York News-Times Sports Editor, Ken Kush, Williams said the whole thing was still kind of a blur, and that he hadn't really taken in all of what had recently transpired.

ery kid's dream, and I am looking forward to the privilege of playing for the Cubs organization," said Williams. "This is a brotherhood here at York College and we help each other out. All my teammates have been 100 percent behind me on this, and I really can't say enough about them. I'll never forget the friendships I have built here."

Williams is from Dyer, Arkansas and transfered to York from North Arkansas Community College. He led the team this season in batting average (0.438) and in homeruns (12). He was voted Region IV Player of the Year and he was the unanimous choice by the conference coaches for MCAC Player of the Year.




Williams adjusted the new Cubs hat he was wearing, and said, "They are


