

s a young girl, Debbie Lewis dreamed of being a wife and mother. She often helped her mother with many household chores, patterning herself after the master example, and co-taught with her in Bible class. When she was in high school she set

another goal - to follow her older brother, Mike, to York College.

Debbie entered York in August of 1973 and fondly became known as "Baby Lewis." The nickname came for two possible reasons: Mike was then teaching at York, and Debbie had beautiful "baby blue" eyes. Athletic director for Delta Chi Alpha, sweetheart for AXE social club, on the Crusader Yearbook staff, and an avid participant in the intramural program, Debbie was very involved in "the YC Experience."

In September of 1974, she met Kimball, a freshman starter on the men's soccer team. Their courtship resulted in wedding bells a year and a half later and the

beginnings of the Matkins' family. Debbie was fulfilling her dream of being a wife and a mother. She prided herself in taking care of her family with love and devotion.

If there is an expression that would fit Debbie's character, it may be her *passion for righteousness*. She did not know how to do something half-way. A hard worker at church as well as at home, Debbie was a faithful Bible class teacher, Bible class coordinator, deacon's - and eventually - elder's wife. She served on many committees and was always found where there was work to be done. Debbie didn't ask for the spotlight for she was satisfied knowing the job was done well and right. Kimball and Debbie's children, Jason and Jenna, had a Christian education long before setting foot on campus as second generation Yorkies.

Every year this couple transported teens from their congregation to High School Days and Soul Quest. Each youth rally that they helped organize had a York College presence. They supported York both financially and as alumni ambassadors. Helping their own

children make the YC choice was the highest level of trust that they could bestow on their alma mater. For that commitment and dedication, Kimball and Debbie were chosen Alumni of the Year recipients in 1999.

Five months later, Debbie passed away in her sleep after a courageous battle with cancer, diagnosed only seven months before. Debbie epitomized the "Woman of Noble Character" in Proverbs 31. Her love for the Lord and her family went beyond what was expected. Those who knew her were the ones truly blessed by her life's influence.

The Debbie Matkins Endowment Scholarship has been established at York to assist other young people fulfill their dream of attending a Christian college.

# Turning Back the Clock

ver 120 former students from classes in the 1930s-50s returned to the York College campus in July to mark the half-century since Old Main burned, as well as to see the changes at the school. The reunion's focus helped alumni to realize the ways their time at the college had affected their lives as well as the lives of countless others. [Don and Ramona Ellison and John and Pat Mann did a splendid job working with the York College team in producing a memorable reunion.]

Alumni traveled from 23 states, including Alaska, Connecticut, Florida, and California. The festivities

began on Tuesday, July 25, as alumni gathered at the Mackey Center.

Memorabilia, displayed by decades, was available for viewing, and there were sign-in sheets to help each alum find specific acquaintances.

A tour of the campus was given on Wednesday. Alumni were able to see their old dormitories, such as Hulitt Hall and Middlebrook, and to walk along the same paths and hallways they had so many years earlier. Reunited choir members held practice sessions at the "Old College Church" as they worked to bring their voices together for a combined performance at worship services on Friday morning. A video was shown Wednesday afternoon, featuring pictures and themes of their time at York College.

A golf tournament was held at the York Country Club on Thursday, and all attended a banquet at the Mackey Center on Thursday night. Gary Bracker of the Class of 1952 was the master of ceremonies, telling tales of choir trips, dorm life, and teenage pranks. Those attending were asked to volunteer stories as well.

The week culminated with worship services at the East Avenue Church on Friday morning. Choir members performed a hymn, harmonizing again for the first time in several decades. Alumni that had recently died were memorialized, while others were recognized for anniversaries.

"This has been an incredible event," said Tom Kirby, class of 1955. "It has been an honor to share, to remember . . . I really want to thank the organizers and the college staff for creating such a wonderful time for all of us."

Kirby addressed the chapel audience, noticing the "... influence the college has had on our lives, and the many changes in the world since we were here. Many say 'It's not like it used to be.' Well, I say, thank God! After 50 years of life experience, we're not the same people. Life has changed. When we left college, we thought we had the world by the tail. It was our time to start planting. Now we look back to see what we reaped."



York College was such a big part of my life as I grew up. My parents, Dr. Walter Johns and Gracie Schell Johns, graduated from the College in 1901 followed by




aunts, uncles, and cousins. We lived next door to Grandpa and Grandma on Kiplinger Ave and it seemed everything centered around the College.




Associate Professor of Business, Marti Soderholm, has sponsored and directed York College's PBL chapter for sixteen years, along with teaching in the business department.





ocial clubs are essential to campus life at York College, and certainly an important aspect of clubs is their service to others. Contained in the very mission of clubs is their commitment to service projects, and this is a large reason why they were established. Senior Katie Klutts said, "I think service projects are a good way for us to get involved in the community, as well as bond with each other through the experiences."

As part of a club's constitution, the members are required to participate in at least two service projects per semester and an additional one during initiation; however, last year, clubs went above and beyond this standard. Six of the eight social clubs turned in reports for completed service projects. The reports concluded that in the 1999-2000 academic year, service project hours totaled 3,400 - equivalent to 106.25 hours per week. The only requirement for a service project is that a club does not receive financial payment for its tasks. Last year, projects ranged from digging cable

lines to babysitting on Friday nights.

As encouragement for clubs to be involved in service, the school gives an award at the end of every school year for the club that has the most hours of service. The women of Omega Phi have won the award the past two years with 1,500 hours, and the men of Sigma Tau came in a close second with 1,000 hours. "We enjoy doing things for others, and have fun doing them," said Kim Johnson, former president of Omega Phi.

Students are creative when it comes to volunteering.

Last April, one club dyed Easter eggs with the residents of
Martin Luther Home. At Christmas, another club went
caroling at the Mahoney House, an assisted living community,
while yet another club painted the fingernails of the ladies
there. Washing fire trucks, collecting food pantry items,
recess duty at Larson Christian Academy, Adopt-A-Highway


projects, reading to kids at the library downtown, car washes ... the list goes on ... and on ... and on.

Labor intensive projects are not excluded from the list. One club dug trenches and helped pour a foundation for a garage. Another club deshingled a roof at Nebraska Youth Camp. Several clubs have helped people move by packing boxes and carrying and loading furniture. Campus minister Mike Rush said, "I think it makes a good statement about the quality of students we have on campus. These statistics are hard evidence of the students' commitment to the community."

Despite the individualism we each bring to our days at York College, there is still a certain amount of structure and pattern. Without a doubt, life at YC would not be the same without social clubs. They provide a place for us to develop needed growth, an opportunity for service and a group we may call comrades. Yet they don't divide us. Instead, they give us a context in which to serve others in His name.

# RECORD PACE

atie Hulstrom transferred to YC this fall from Southwest Texas

State where she ran Division I cross country, the highest level of competition for colleges and universities. She chose to come to York because of its spiritual climate. According to Katie, there are positive differences in running here: "The team is closer, and the relaxed atmosphere makes it more enjoyable to run."

Stepping down from the big league hasn't hurt her success. "I've been running as well or better," Hulstrom commented. She took first place at the Dana Invite with a time of 19:18 in the 5,000-meter run, a time just five seconds short of the school record she set the week before where she beat 26 of the 40 D-1 runners. Head Coach Roger Collins stated, "Katie ran a great race. She took control of the race early, defeating some excellent Berry College runners who are rated in the top 25 in NAIA."

Two weeks later she eclipsed that record by 36 seconds at 18:37 and came in fourth at the Concordia Invite. The only three runners to best that time were NAIA All-Americans from last year. Naturally, Collins was delighted with her efforts and made the statement, "She's running with the big dogs."

Hulstrom and men's cross country runner, Aaron Fletcher, qualified for the national NAIA meet this year.

The 1916 York College football team had a record of 8-0 scoring 147 points to their opponents' 0. They carried off the state championship and had six players named to the all-state team: Jake Glur, George Jahn, Glen Bland, "Dad White", "Big Jim" Conway, and Glen "Shelly" Shellmadine. President M.O. McLaughlin stated, "So far as we are able to discover, no college football team in all this western country has ever made such a remarkable record."

"There isn't much glitter and glitz on this team,

and when you see us in warm-ups, we aren't going to scare you. But these guys are fundamentally and physically sound, because of the way they dedicated themselves in the offseason," said Head Men's Basketball Coach Brett McDaniel. "They worked hard lifting weights, they ran, and they had a great work ethic. Not much showtime, but a lot of hard work."

Entering his fifth year as coach, McDaniel returns six letter-winners including seniors Tyrone Grady, Mark Krajewski, Brian Gilchriest, and Derek Hose; and juniors Torrence Grose and Tyrone Nash. He has a bench he feels he can go eight to 10 men deep. McDaniel said they are a little thin at point guard and injuries could play a big role if they were to lose some players.

"We can't afford to lose a lot to injury. We have guys who are capable of stepping in and doing the job, but there is no substitution for on-the-court experience," said McDaniel.

"Last year we shot the three-point shot a lot, and if we hit the shot we won some of those games. But when we missed

we struggled. This year I feel we have both the inside and outside game and won't be so predictable to other teams," McDaniel commented. "A lot of guys who don't start may see

as many minutes as some of the starters. I feel comfortable the bench can do the job."

"You can only practice so much. These guys are ready to get on the court and get the season started," commented McDaniel. "Last year the team may have taken some short cuts when it came to conditioning and getting ready, and they wore out physically. I don't think that will be a problem with this year's team."

# To York and Back Again

I never planned on going to York College. In fact, until my best friend told me he was going there to play baseball, I never knew the school existed. The school is located in what I used to consider "the middle of nowhere." I honestly didn't want to stay after my first day on campus, but a piece of legal paper and my parents' love changed my life forever.

Let me start out by telling you how I got to York, Nebraska, in the first place. It's a story some of you may be able to relate to. After graduating from a very small high school in Albany, Texas, I was accepted for admission to Baylor University in the spring of 1988. Baylor, like most private schools, is an expensive place to receive your education. A clerical error caused my financial aid package to cancel, forcing me to take a year off from school and work. I saved a bit of money that year and made plans to go to the University of Texas the next fall.

That summer of '89, I received a phone call from my best friend, James. He was going to York to play baseball and wanted me to go with him. The thought of going to a school as large as the University of Texas was intimidating, so when • She is being raised by her two-year my friend told me the size of York College and how they were so helpful with his financial aid, I immediately became interested. He gave my name to Steddon Sikes, who proceeded to call me quite frequently (as I'm sure he has done to a lot of you!). I was overwhelmed by how much this school wanted me to be a part of their community. After being assured that financial aid would cover my school expenses, I made the decision to go. James and I packed up my old '78 Ford LTD II and made our way northward to York that late August. It was a trip I would become very familiar with over the next few days.

After arriving on campus, I immediately became homesick. After all, I had lived in Albany all my life and had never been away from my family for more than a week. Steddon greeted us and showed us around. We unpacked our things and began moving into our room on 4 South in Thomas Hall. The room was smaller than we expected and it seemed that everyone else in the dorm had become acquainted already. Though my best friend was with me, I truly felt alone, It wasn't long before James and I discussed our situation. He also was extremely homesick and wanted to return to Albany. We decided to call our parents and let them know we were not happy and heading back to Texas. I can still remember my parents pleading with me to give the school a chance. They reminded me that I would have to find a job when I go back and that I would have no future without a college education. I refused to listen and told them I would be home late the next evening.

The next morning, James and I re-packed my car and prepared to leave. Steddon tried to convince us to stay, reminding us to just stick it out and give the school a chance to grow on us. We understood what he was saying, but the feelings of being alone and away from home were too much. The 12-hour drive to our hometown was long and uneventful. I asked James what he planned on doing when we got back to Albany. Like me, he was unsure and figured that we could work this semester and try to go to a junior college near home that spring. It sounded like a good plan, but our parents had something else in mind.

After walking in I noticed that my father was pacing the floor and my mother was sitting at the dining room table. She had obviously been crying and was holding a single yellow sheet of legal paper.

I hugged her, but knew that something was wrong. She handed me the paper that turned out to be, of all things, a contract. It stated that, while not enrolled in college, I would be charged room-and-board. Until I found a job to pay for my room-and-board, I would be given a list of jobs to do each day to earn my keep. After finding a job, I would be charged for room rent, meals, laundry services, and car privileges. I sat at that kitchen table in total shock, not believing that my parents could be doing this to me. My mother began crying again, telling me how • 1997 much they loved me, but that it was time to grow up and get out on my own. I can still remember the weight of that statement and how it jolted me. They were right, but what to do now. That's when the phone rang.

It was James. Apparently our parents had discussed the situation and decided to come to a joint solution, for he had been presented with the same exact contract upon entering his front door. The choice that lay before us was obvious; we were going back to York! The only question was would the school give us a second chance? I called Steddon the next morning, and he said we were more than welcome to return. So, once again, we made the trip north to Nebraska.

After arriving, we moved into our new room, this time on 4 Main of Thomas Hall. We had missed freshman orientation, but it wasn't long before we became acquainted with everyone on our wing. Our immediate neighbors were also from Texas, whom we hit if off with immediately. The trepidation we both

felt at being so far away from home quickly disappeared. In the end, some of the best friendships I've ever made were during that first year of school. It seems so funny now, but when I first stepped foot on the York College campus, all I could think about was leaving. The day I graduated, all I could think about was how much I would miss this school and how it had changed my life.

New students are always wondering what the "York Experience" really is. Well, for me it's the opportunity to have God mold you into someone you never knew you could be. Had I not gone back to York, my life would be totally different right now, and there is nothing I would change about how my life has evolved since then. All it took was a tear-stained sheet of legal paper.


