



- Excerpts from a letter to York College -

o many times kind deeds are not acknowledged. That is why I would like to personally thank you for taking the time to check York College's archives on information regarding my grandfather, Enrique Rivera Vives.

It has been challenging trying to gather information; however, your kindness has added information to my genealogy project.

My grandfather, humble as he was, accomplished a lot in his lifetime. After graduating from York College in 1924 he served as a missionary in the Dominican Republic for 16 years.

During those years he met with Charles A. Lindbergh in 1928. As Lindbergh was returning home from his "Good Will Flight," he visited the Caribbean. I proudly hang the picture of my grandfather, Mr. Lindbergh, and the Ambassador to the Dominican Republic in my living room.

My grandfather was also very active in youth activities. While performing his missionary work, he was founder of organized sports, including basketball, volleyball, softball, and track and field in the Dominican Republic. He was also founder of the Boy Scouts in the Dominican Republic.

For his accomplishments, on October 12, 1977 Rev. Enrique Rivera Vives was inducted into the Sports Hall of Fame in the Dominican Republic. Quite a proud day for all of us.

He was Pastor of the First United Presbyterian Church in Puerto Rico from 1943 until his retirement in '66. He passed away

He is gone, but his good deeds live on through people like yourself. Again, thank you and God Bless.



Spring Enrollment at All-time High

he 2001 spring enrollment for York College is at an all-time high with 470 students, up from the record set last spring of 466.

"I think the increase is really about the economic demand for teachers. About one-fourth of our student body are education majors; that is huge," said Stewart Sikes ('79), YC Registrar.

York College has come a long way since its beginnings. To accommodate the increased number of students, several changes are in the works for improvements on the campus as well as in the classroom.

"We're working on a computer program that will allow students to check their degree plans instead of always going through advisors. This will help keep everyone accountable as well as help students educate themselves of various degree options," said Sikes.

Kristin Mathews ('98), third year admissions counselor, attributes the enrollment increase to student body activity around the nation.

"The current students are a big voice for York College. Athletics are awesome and continuing to improve; the music



department travels nation-wide and all these programs get our name out there," commented Mathews.

"Our programs are top notch and represent York College really well. I'm always proud of what we send out," Mathews added.

Although YC Admissions focuses primarily on fall enrollment, potential students are always encouraged to visit and enroll when it is convenient for them.

Mathews said, "The fall enrollment is our huge push. It is more natural and an easier transition for most students, but we always work with students and just try to get them to come."

York College has by no means reached the climax in its student population. With several campus-wide changes in the works, many at the college hope to one day reach 1000 stu-

"Right now our campus can easily accommodate 750 students, but it would be ideal to be closer to 1000," said Sikes. "An increase in numbers decreases stress on everyone financially. Changes and growth are where this campus is headed."

ork College's SIFE Team (Students in Free Enterprise) was one of fifteen college groups to receive an Honorable Mention Award in SIFE National Teach A Child About Business Week competition. The team developed a project for children that furthered their comprehension of the free enterprise system by looking at the retail business.

"Show biz" doesn't come close.


Songfest is so much more than just entertainment on the big stage. It may have had its beginnings as a talent show in '77, but it's come a long way through the twenty-four year history. Hosts and hostesses, club shows, costumes, the whole spectrum of music, stage props, lights, sound ... that's what the audience gets. Two hours and it's over; it was a great \$5 investment.

That's one perspective.


But the nuts and bolts of Songfest make the production a major part of the campus scenery for more than half the academic year. Auditions for Hosts and Hostesses were held in October this year. Club show ideas were to be turned in to Student Services by the second week of November. Plans for music, costumes, rehearsals, and choreography have deadlines as well as major points attached.

Club shows (brother/sister clubs perform together) are awarded points for each night's performance by a panel of community judges who look at costumes, choreography, music, theme, and over-all show appeal. However, approximately half the points a show can earn are tallied long before the curtain rises.

Rehearsals alone have points awarded in five different areas: beginning on time, giving attention to direction, good use

of time, problem solving strategies, and organization. Members of the Songfest Committee visit club practices to not only evaluate their progress, but they also give valuable advice on areas to improve and plenty of encouragement.

Barbara Goodwin, Dean of Student Services and

Producer of Songfest, has put in many long hours as a member of the Songfest Committee. She said, "The club shows within Songfest are student produced and directed. Student Services provides a structure with guidelines and timetables, but the creativity, talent and effort that the students put into their own work is what brings quality and uniqueness to each show."

Starting practice with a prayer sets the tone.

Uniqueness? After twenty-four years of shows, how do clubs come up with something different?

What one sees in the April production is a sum of its members. Competition for the best club show has some students thinking year-round about ideas to incorporate. A new song hits the charts at the beginning of summer. 'Hey, we've got to use that in next year's show.' Scenes from a movie can trigger the response, 'Did you see that move? ... definitely Songfest material.' Factor in that this year's student body represents 37 states and 17 countries, and you get a


unique show every time.

Dr. Clark Roush, Chair of the Music Department and this year's Director of Songfest, has been involved with over a dozen Songfest productions. "It is rewarding to help them through the process, and then depend on them to help come

up with a top quality show," he commented.

Songfest is not just show biz. It's family. Ah, ... it's "the York Experience."









MEN AND WOMEN HAVE RECORD BASKETBALL SEASONS



Gerry Nixon receives Co-Coach of the Year honors

anther Basketball was at an all-time high this year as both teams set season records for wins since beginning play at the four-year level. For the Lady Panthers, it didn't start out with very much promise. At the Thanksgiving break they were at 3-7, and it looked like they might struggle on the year. But a seven-toone run before the holiday break put a big wish on the list for Coach Nixon ... the first winning season in more than a decade?

The Panthers, led by All-Conference players Misty Wellman and Holly Keith, were up for the

challenge as they came back the second semester and put nine more games in the win column. After a dismal beginning, they finished with a record season 19-14 and tied for third in the Midlands Collegiate Athletic Confer-



Coach Gerry Nixon was named the MCAC Co-Coach of the Year and four players were given post season honors. Junior center, Wellman - York, NE, and sophomore forward, Keith -

> Bolivar, MO, were named to the all-conference team

while junior guard, Amanda DeBerry -Madisonville, KY, and sophomore point guard, April Johnson - Cambridge, NE, were named to the honorable mention team.

Wellman averaged a double-double for the Panthers with 11.6 points and 10.1 rebounds. Keith scored over 11 points per game. Wellman and DeBerry both reached the 1000th career point this season.

For the men, it was an exciting season from the start as Coach Brett McDaniel had predicted in the courtside preview. The Panthers' first time to be ranked in the NAIA Division II coaches poll put them at 19th in the nation shortly after the holiday break.

A large factor in that tally of votes was the road win over NAIA Div. I perennial powerhouse, Oklahoma Christian University in the first half of the season. Senior center, Mark Krajewski - Arvada, CO, made the buzzer beater that had its rippling effects for the entire campaign.

McDaniel said the team discussed a potential game-winning play, but there's only so much you can do in 4.1 seconds. "I drew something up and Tyrone [Grady] drove up the court and got sandwiched and sort of floated a pass to Mark," McDaniel said. "Mark caught it and shot it as the buzzer sounded ... and it went in!"

"When York was a junior college, a lot of our players would feed into that [OCU] program," McDaniel added. "So for us to go in there and beat them was really big for us. They have won


20 or more games in 15 of the last 18 years, and it was just unbelievable."

Travis Love, junior guard transfer from Hartshorne, OK, was one of three York College men to receive postseason honors. He was named to the allconference team and was also named Newcomer of the Year after averaging 12 points per game for the Panthers.

> Tyrone Grady, senior guard from Newport, AR, who put in over 14 points per game, was also named to all-conference honors while Krajewski was tabbed as an honorable mention selection.

Under Coach McDaniel the Panthers had a record 21-11 season since beginning competition as a


four-year college and finished third in the conference at 6-4.







OPTIMISTIC OUTLOOK FOR SOFTBALL & BASEBALL TEAMS


he Lady Panthers, led by 21-game winner and All-Conference pitcher Tiana Endicott, head into the 2001 season cautiously optimistic after last year's 30-19 team.

Coach Rex Reynolds said Endicott will have to shoulder most of the pitching duties this season which will put a premium on solid play in the field. "We have a 21-game winner back in Tiana. Unfortunately, that puts more emphasis on our defense," he said. "We've got to make every play and can't afford to make mistakes."

Fortunately, some new additions to the lineup should help shore up those defensive slots, particularly in the infield. Two familiar faces return to York College after taking some time off. Shortstop Carolyn Barr is back after a semester off, and Emiko Noma, a junior second baseman, returns to the team after a year's absence.

Senior leadership on the corners with third baseman Natalie Grow and first baseman Christy VandenHeuvel will complement those solid gloves. "Our infield is about as solid as you can get," commented Reynolds. "We've got seniors on the corners, Barr at short and Emi at second, and we've got a good senior catcher (Lynette Pickering) who was second-team All-Conference.

Reynolds also likes the look of his outfield, which includes firstteam All-Conference center fielder Julie Jondro and freshman Jennifer



he 2000 season was a special one on the diamond for the York College baseball program. The Panthers posted a 29-29 record under first-year coach Milan Rasic. The 29 victories established a school record and the team achieved its first .500 season since its inception as a NAIA member in 1994. York finished the cam-

paign ranked 6th in the NAIA Region IV Poll.

On a national scale, the Panthers realized several team and individual honors. The offense averaged 8.96 runs per game and finished 16th in the nation with a .353 team batting average. NAIA Honorable Mention All-American Greig McAlpin was ranked 10th in the nation in home runs (19), and 20th in RBI (74). All-MCAC outfielder Brian Walth finished 6th in the NAIA in runs scored (78). Outfielder Tom Garden ended the year 18th in the country in doubles (24). In addition, Devon Teeple earned NAIA National Pitcher of the Week honors for consecutive back-to-back complete game shutouts.

In all, six starters return from a team that reached the regional tournament for the first time in school history. The Lady Panthers should be in the thick of the MCAC chase this season.

March 10, 2001 - After inclement weather cancelled the first few games of the spring season, YC softball went 4 for 5 in their opening tournament, outscoring their opponents 31-11.

York College is looking at 2001 as an opportunity to pick up where it left off in 2000. Winners of 29 of their last 46 games (.630) a year ago, the Panthers, led by 15 returning lettermen, look to climb to new heights. A fine recruiting class, highlighted by eight pitchers, promises to provide the club with more depth and versatility this season.

Six starters return in the field, including the outfield trio of Brian Walth, Tom Garden, and Matt Fonteno. Together, they combined to hit .391 and drive in 139 runs for the Panthers last year. Casey Thornhill, and newcomers Grady Tweit and Don Cornell, bring added power to an already capable offense.

On defense, the team will be improved inside the infield with transfers Aaron Beauchamp and Kris Lamm joining sophomore Denis Wallace. Riley Killingsworth, Nick Harlan, and Jeremiah Rector return to anchor the infield corners. The catching tandem of Jake Carr and Shane Phillips will provide stability for the Panthers behind the plate.

York College will come at opponents with a more talented and experienced pitching staff in 2001. With 14 pitchers on the roster, the club is assured of more options in late-inning situations. A depleted staff was the major culprit in the Panthers losing 17 games by one or two runs in 2000.

Seniors Devon Teeple and Josh Hansen return to the starting rotation. The two combined to work 163 innings for the Panthers last season. Transfers Jesse Welch, Joe Jenkins, and Ryan Parker will all see significant action in starting roles. The team will rely heavily on a bullpen by committee approach to balance out the staff.

With twelve seniors and a solid foundation in place, the 2001 York College Panthers expect to compete at a high level with the best programs in NAIA baseball.

Sorry it took so long to reply! School has been a little busy and I have been volunteering with a guy who does movie and TV work with dogs, so I went to "prep" for a shoot a couple of days. I feel so Hollywood! ©

I have had an experience beyond even my wildest of dreams, literally! I have gotten to work with animals that I never even knew existed before I got into the EATM [Exotic Animal Training and Management] program, such as a kinkajou. I even get to walk. a wolf, which not many people can say!

I have also learned a lot of lessons about faith because I have lost guite a few animals, and it can feel like losing a family member, but you have to keep going because you have plenty of other animals depending on your care. I know that God put me here to take care of things, whether it is animals or people, and I thank Him every day for the opportunities that He has blessed me with. I still wonder if I am worthy of this at times, I know that I work hard to try to deserve it!

The Cat Ambassador Program is a great program that enlists the talents of different small felines (servals, lynx, caracal, ocelots, and cheetahs) to educate people of all ages about the importance of conservation and our role in helping to preserve the world for years to come. I was able to see a cheetah run at full speed using a dog

running lure system. It sounded like thunder as he (Moya a 3yr old Cheetah) ran at top speed only about 20 feet away from me. AMAZING! I was also able to spend some time with a baby ocelot, which was born at the Cincinnati Zoo in quite an amazing way. She was the first embryo transplant ocelot ever born. She was "frozen" for 2 years and then implanted into a surrogate ocelot and born naturally. AMAZING! I still can't believe that I was really able to do all that I did.



Dolphin Quest was paradise! I was in Hawaii in 80 degree weather while every one at home was cold and rainy! I actually got to SWIM with dolphins! They take amazing care of their animals and I got to participate in some of their medical work. They do ultrasounds with their pregnant females, so not only did I get to be in the water with 4 month old dolphins, I got to see babies not even born yet! AAAAHHHHH! I just can't

believe it! I still get chills when I think about all of it!

I just picked up some pics today of me with Jack Hanna from an appearance on Larry King Live. I took an African Serval that I have been working with for about a year in my program. It was a great experience to meet the man who was one of the reasons I have wanted to work with animals. Mr. Hanna proclaims himself as an encyclopedia of misinformation, but is a great example of hard work and dedication.
