n the city of Hildesheim, Germany, little seems out of the ordinary with the last name of Roehrkasse. But ask Don ('78) and Cindy (McMickle '80) twenty years ago if they could see themselves today raising a family (three girls and a boy) and serving as full-time missionaries and you might get a puzzled look.

Though both are YC alumni from the Midwest, Don - Laramie, Wyo. and Cindy - Littleton, Col., their paths never crossed until they were both in Germany.

Don was recruited to York College on a basketball scholarship and was part of a "wild bunch" his freshman year. To say the least, missions was not even a consideration. However, through the influence of good friends he became a Christian after his junior year in college and spent two summers on campaign trips to Germany. Don said, "This awakened my desire to come for a longer period. I originally planned to stay for two years and then come back to the States for graduate school or get an accounting job in Denver, Cindy, on the other hand, had wanted to be a full-time missionary since she was a

closer to home. But then I extended for another year because I enjoyed the work."

teenager. While a student at York she spent time in the MAP program in preparation for foreign missions. Although she was not able to travel during her first two years, professors such as Dr. Robert Lawrence and Dr. Tom Schulz had a great impact on her life and her faith.

Cindy got to know Germany when her brother was in the services and married a German girl - Cindy and her folks flew over for the wedding and she fell in love with the people and country. She traveled back to Germany in 1983 through what was then the MARK Apprentice program out of Abilene.

Cindy worked for three and a half years in the west central city of Cologne while Don worked alone 150 miles to the northeast in Hannover. They began their long distance courtship and were married in 1986. After serving another four years together in Hannover they moved twenty miles south to the city of Hildesheim in 1990 to start a new

church.

Don and Cindy were very involved in student life during their years at YC.

In an email correspondence the question was asked of the Roehrkasse's where they see themselves ten years down the road. Don replied, "After we got married, we both decided that Germany is where God wanted us to be, and that we would just stay in Germany until HE made it clear that He wanted us elsewhere."

Fork College Campus Minister, Michael J. Rush ('84), had a stroke Tuesday afternoon, April 16, in his office. A student found him on the floor able to talk but not move. An ambulance took him to York General Hospital around 3:30 p.m. and he was later transported by ambulance to St.

Elizabeth in Lincoln. By the time he reached Lincoln he was in a coma.

He immediately went into surgery and the doctors removed a blood clot to relieve the pressure that had built up in his brain. The clot was described to be about the size of a lemon. The neurologist said Mike had a condition called Arteriovenous Malformation, which he's had since birth and that the veins had ruptured.

The divisional chapels that were scheduled for the following day were cancelled and everyone met at East Hill for a combined prayer service. As students arrived they were able to sign up for ten-minute time slots on a 24-hour prayer vigil.

The hushed silence was a reminder of the gripping chapel service on 9/11.

Professor Shane Mountjoy ('88) gave a morning update to the YC family that he had just received from the hospital. "The doctors now believe the brain damage to be extensive and that there will be some paralysis in





U.S. Senator Ben Nelson of Nebraska gave the commencement address challenging the graduates to take chances. "Everyone will leave here with an education, but I encourage you to



was awarded the Dale R. Larsen Teacher of Achievement Award and \$1,000 for his commitment to professional excellence. McNeese has


written and edited over 40 books and educational materials for young and adolescent readers, as well as college students and adults. He has taught at York since 1992.





irst year Head Coach Jerry Laird now has a season of college baseball behind him. Laird took his high school team in North Little Rock, Ark., to three consecutive state tournament appearances (State Champs in 2000) before signing on with York College this past summer.




Despite the loss of twelve outstanding seniors from the recordmaking 2001 squad and having only two months of recruiting available, Laird put together a very respectable year. The Panthers finished the regular season 25/21 and 10/9 in the conference.

Among the season's best wins were those against NCAA Div. II teams Univ. of Southern Colorado, West Texas State Univ., and a double header sweep over the Univ. of Nebraska Kearney. Also, for the first time since 1996, the Panthers defeated NAIA perennial

Coach Chapman has several recruits signed for next year that will add more depth to the squad.







he second issue of the *Heritage* featured the 1899 faculty on the cover with William E. Schell as President (1897-1913). The following issue included a letter to the editor from Vivian (Johns '29) Wehrbein that thanked us for recognizing her grandfather. She also wrote, "...I will never forget York College and have an abiding interest in its progress. I am so thankful that it is in such good hands and continues to be a Christian school."

That "abiding interest" gave us quite a surprise on May 29 when Vivian and her nephew, Dr. Arthur Murdoch ('56), gave to York College several memorabilia items including Dr. Murdoch's freshman beanie, band hat and letter, and a pennant. A framed picture of the YC family around 1912 and a large silver chalice given to President Schell by the class of 1913 for his sixteen years of service made the presentation an extraordinary experience.
